Circulating and Filing Schedule continued:

(If the Secretary of State notifies the county to determine the number of qualified voters who signed the petition on a date other than 07/18/24, the last day is no later than the thirtieth business day after the county's receipt of notification.) (Elections Code § 9030(d), (e).)

- f. If the signature count is more than 962,106 or less than 830,909, then the Secretary of State certifies the petition as qualified or failed and notifies the counties. If the signature count is between 830,909 and 962,106 inclusive, then the Secretary of State notifies the counties using the random sampling technique to determine the validity of **all** signatures. (Elections Code §§ 9030(f), (g), 9031(a))......Thursday, 09/05/24¹

(If the Secretary of State notifies the county to determine the number of qualified voters who have signed the petition on a date other than 09/05/24, the last day is no later than the sixtieth business day after the county's receipt of notification.) (Elections Code § 9031(b), (d).)

 h. Secretary of State certifies whether the petition has been signed by the number of qualified voters required to declare the petition sufficient. (Elections Code §§ 9031(e), 9033(a))......Thursday, 12/12/24¹

This means that the petitions cannot be used to create or add to mailing lists or similar lists for any purpose, including fundraising or requests for support. Any such misuses constitutes a crime under California law. (Elections Code § 18650; *Bilofsky* v. *Deukmejian* (1981) 124 Cal.App.3d 825, 177 Cal.Rptr. 621; 63 Ops.Cal.Atty.Gen. 37 (1980).)

- When a petition is presented to the county elections official for filing by someone other than the proponent(s), the required authorization shall include the name or names of the persons filing the petition. (Elections Code § 9032.)
