RE: Presidential Primary: Ballots, Provisional Ballot Envelope Supplies, and

Alternative Procedures - Action Required

While every active registered voter will receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election, some voters may choose to appear at polling locations across the state to vote in person.

Ballot Supplies

For those voters who intend to vote in person on Election Day, and who appear at a polling location and can surrender their vote-by-mail ballot, they should be provided a non-provisional ballot to cast. For those voters who appear at a polling location without their vote-by-mail ballot to surrender, they may need to vote using a provisional ballot. (See, CCROV # 24029.)

Additionally, conditional voter registration ("same day registration") must be made available to voters at all permanent and satellite county elections offices and all polling locations. (See, CCROV # 24026.) Accordingly, there may be a larger than normal number of voters who will need to vote using a provisional ballot. (See, Elec. Code, §§2170, 14310.)

For these reasons, the Secretary of State's office urges counties to plan accordingly to ensure that each polling location has enough ballots, including any required multilingual ballots, and other voting materials available. Additionally, the Secretary of State's office recommends that counties provide each satellite office and polling location with a sufficient supply of provisional ballot envelopes, CVR provisional ballot envelopes, and voter registration cards.

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The Secretary of State's office urges counties to remind poll workers of the provisional balloting procedures and that every person has a right to cast a provisional ballot for any reason under Elections Code section 14310 and Help America Vote Act of 2002, section 302.

Alternative Procedures

In the unlikely event there are insufficient ballots or insufficient ballot printing supplies, if applicable, at a polling location, Elections Code section 14299 requires counties to have alternative procedures in place. Any ballot cast using an approved alternative procedure must be duplicated in accordance with the procedure set forth in Elections Code section 15210.

Attached to this memorandum is a survey requesting the specific alternative procedure(s) that your county will have in place in the event there are insufficient ballots or insufficient ballot printing supplies, if applicable, at a polling location for the March 5, 2022, Primary Election. (See, Elec. Code, § 14299(c).)
