

15-DAY REPORT OF REGISTRATION October 19, 2020, for the November 3, 2020, General Election

TRENDS

Since the last 15-Day Report of Registration for a general in a presidential election year (October 24, 2016):

- The total voter registration in the state increased from 19,411,771 to 22,047,448.
- The percentage of the total number of registered voters compared to the number of people who are eligible to register to vote increased from 78.0% to 87.9%.
- The percentage of voters who have no party preference decreased from 24.3% to 24.0%.
- The percentage of voters registered with a qualified political party decreased from 75.1% to 75.0%.
- The percentage of voters registered with the Democratic Party increased from 44.9% to 46.1%.
- The percentage of voters registered with the Republican Party decreased from 26.0% to 24.2%.

¹Since September 26, 2016, 16- and 17-year-olds can pre-register to vote. Once they turn 18, they become automatically registered. Preregistered voters may be activated before their 18th birthday if they will be 18 in an upcoming election. Those pre-registered voters were not eliminated from pre-registration statistics since they remain pre-registrants until their 18th birthday. Therefore, some voters are counted in both pre-registration and active registration statistics. ²Historical pre-registration totals show how many people pre-registered to vote since pre-registration began on September 26, 2016, including

pre-registered voters who have since turned 18 and have become active voters.
