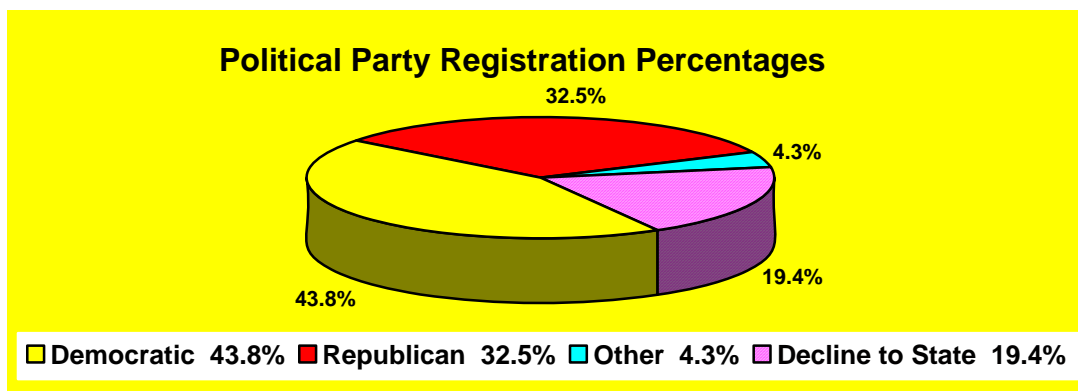

TRENDS

Since the last 15-Day Report of Registration during a presidential election year (February 17, 2004):

- The total voter registration in the state has increased from 15,091,160 to 16,123,787.
- The percentage of the total number of registered voters compared to the number of people who were eligible to register to vote has increased from 68.95% to 70.00%.
- The percentage number of voters who have declined to state their political party has increased from 16.4% to 19.4%.
- The percentage of people registered with a qualified political party has declined from 83.0% to 79.9%.
- The percentage of voters registered with the Democratic Party has increased from 43.2% to 43.8%.
- The percentage of voters registered with the Republican Party has declined from 35.6% to 32.5%.
