

**Official Declaration of the Result of the General Election  
Held on Tuesday, November 8, 1994, throughout the State of California  
on Statewide Measures Submitted to a Vote of Electors**

**The following laws were adopted by vote of electors:**

**Effective Date**

"An initiative . . . approved by a majority of votes thereon takes effect the day after the election unless the measure provides otherwise . . . . If provisions of 2 or more measures approved at the same election conflict, those of the measure receiving the highest affirmative vote shall prevail." See Cal. Const., Art. II, Sec. 10.

"A proposed [legislative] amendment or revision shall be submitted to the electors and if approved by a majority of votes thereon takes effect the day after the election unless the measure provides otherwise. If provisions of 2 or more measures approved at the same election conflict, those of the measure receiving the highest affirmative vote shall prevail." See Cal. Const., Art. XVIII, Sec. 4.

Bond Proposals submitted to the electors by the Legislature also become effective the day following approval by a majority of votes thereon. See Cal. Const., Art. XVI, Sec. 1.
