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INTRODUCTION

California Students Vote Project Overview

Established in 2016, the California Secretary of State (SOS) Students Vote Project (SVP) is a statewide nonpartisan program that elevates college student voices and promotes civic engagement efforts to build a more inclusive democracy. Through the creation of the Students Vote Project, California was the first state in the nation to build partnerships across the state's major higher education systems to empower college students to participate in the democratic process. Program objectives include increasing college student voter education, voter registration, and outreach. The SVP achieves these objectives by hosting civic engagement events, creating educational resources, and partnering with campuses and outreach organizations.

One civic engagement event that occurs during statewide election years is the <u>California University and College Ballot Bowl</u>. Created in 2018, the Ballot Bowl is a friendly competition where all California higher education systems can compete to register the most students to vote.

Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (SCVEA)

In 2019, the Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (**California Education Code <u>S66850-66852</u>; <u>California Elections Code <u>§2148.5</u></u>) was enacted to give California colleges and universities the necessary tools to increase civic engagement and participation among young voters. In 2020, the California Secretary of State Students Vote Project was expanded to support and ensure implementation of the landmark law. The law requires the California SOS to work directly with the California Community Colleges (CCCs) and California State Universities (CSUs) to increase college student voter registration. Colleges and universities are encouraged to participate in SVP civic learning opportunities to receive and distribute voter education resources. While the University of California (UC) and the Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities (AICCU) campuses are not required to participate, they continue to be strong partners and supporters of student civic engagement.**

COLLEGE STUDENT VOTER REGISTRATION

This section discusses methods utilized by the California Students Vote Project (SVP) for tracking college student voter registration and the 2023 college student voter registration data reported to the California Secretary of State (SOS).

Tracking

A comprehensive approach is used to monitor college student voter registration, covering online registrations, physical voter registration cards, and the systematic updating of voter registration numbers by campus throughout the year. Below is a detailed description of each tracking method used by the California SOS.

Online Voter Registration

College students' registration by campus is tracked through a unique URL, https://registertovote.ca.gov/?t=s. This unique registration link allows the California SOS to track student voter registrations by college/university. The SVP partnered with <u>Rock the Vote</u> and the <u>Student Public Interest Research Groups</u> to assist with several college student registrations that were not captured through the unique URL.

Physical Voter Registration

Physical voter registration cards (VRCs) can be requested by campuses from the California SOS. The Voter Registration Card Statement of Distribution form is the best way to request physical VRCs. When completing the form, please note that you are requesting cards for **college students and include the campus name**.

If a campus receives physical VRCs from their local County Elections Office or County Registrar of Voters, contact the respective county to request the affidavit number range. Once the affidavit number range is received from the county, email the number range to **caststudentsvote@sos.ca.gov**.

The affidavit number is red and will have 2 digits, 2 alphabet letters, and 6 digits. Following these steps will allow the California SOS to track voter registration to include in the data and reporting sent to the State Legislature

Track College Student Voter Registration Numbers by Campus

College student voter registration numbers are updated monthly throughout the year. Track campuses here: <u>https://caballotbowl.sos.ca.gov</u>.

2023 College Student Voter Registration Data

The 2023 college student voter registration data is analyzed to show the online and physical registration trends among college students and 18-25-year-olds.

College Students

From December 1, 2022, to November 30, 2023, the overall number of college students who registered to vote online through the unique URL, https://registertovote.ca.gov/?t=s, or the registration was reported through the physical VRCs to the California SOS was 4,714.

18-25-Year-Olds

- From December 1, 2022, to November 30, 2023, the total number of 18-25year-olds who registered to vote was 862,584. This is an 8% increase from the 2022 data reported of 795,814 for 18-24-year-olds.
 - Of the 18-25-year-old registrations, 72,004 were from physical VRCs and 44,655 were from online voter registration.
- As of December 1, 2023, there are currently 2,713,060 active voters in California who are between the ages of 18-25.

Due to a significant number of campuses or college students registering to vote using the traditional URL, <u>https://registertovote.ca.gov</u>, or physical VRCs not provided from the California SOS, analyzing both groups (college students and 18-25-year-olds) provided the SVP with a better understanding of these demographics.

CALIFORNIA STUDENTS VOTE PROJECT PROGRAMMING

In 2023, the California Students Vote Project (SVP) focused on civic engagement through resource creation, quarterly meetings, award ceremonies, office hours, tabling, and strategic partnerships with higher education systems. See below for a detailed description of the programming implemented this year.

Civic Engagement Resources

Civic and election resources were created to assist higher education campuses, faculty, and students with the voting process for voter education and implementation of the Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (SCVEA). The following are the 2023 civic engagement resources:

- **2023-2024 California Civic and Election Dates Calendar:** This calendar features the upcoming election dates and civic holidays. A QR code is made available to the SVP website.
- Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Implementation (SCVEA) Guide: The SVP team created an implementation guide for the SCVEA. This guide breaks down the SCVEA in a more digestible fashion for campuses to implement.
- <u>Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan (CVEAP) Guidelines</u>: The SVP created guidelines for drafting a Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan also known as a CVEAP.
- <u>Website Revamp</u>: The improved website, <u>https://studentsvoteproject.sos.ca.gov</u>, is more user friendly and includes all information related to SVP along with a hub of civic and election resources.

Civic Engagement Events

The SVP team held and participated in a variety of events including:

- Quarterly meetings
- California University and College Ballot Bowl Award Ceremonies
- Office Hours and Tabling

Quarterly Meetings

Throughout 2023, the SVP hosted three quarterly meetings, drawing a total of 484 registrations and virtual attendees. These meetings consisted of a variety of topics including SVP program updates, a civic engagement outreach training, an action plan workshop, and spotlight speakers from universities, colleges, counties, and nonpartisan organizations.

- **March:** Shared program updates and plans for 2023 college student civic engagement.
- **July:** Hosted a civic engagement training focused on effective outreach events and strategies for college students.
- **October:** Presented information on how campuses can implement civic engagement through updated resources for colleges and universities.

California University and College Ballot Bowl Awards Ceremonies

The California University and College Ballot Bowl is a competition where all California colleges and universities compete to register the most students to vote. The SVP honored the champion and winning campuses, which consisted of 75 attendees.

- **Champion Awards Ceremony:** Stanford University was the 2022 California University and College Ballot Bowl Champion. In a show of appreciation for their outstanding civic engagement efforts, Secretary of State, Shirley N. Weber, Ph.D., the SVP, and California Secretary of State staff traveled to Stanford University to honor the students and faculty who registered 1,046 students to vote.
- **Virtual Awards Ceremony:** The 2022 Virtual Awards Ceremony honored the winners of the 2022 California University and College Ballot Bowl competition. The biennial Ballot Bowl first launched in 2018.

Office Hours and Tabling

Office Hours was introduced by SVP during their first quarterly meeting. The SVP had a total of 22 Office Hour appointments. Office Hours is a designated time when the SVP team is available to provide support, guidance, and resources. Office Hours demonstrates commitment to engaging with colleges, universities, college students

and organizations by dedicating a time each week to guarantee availability. The SVP team also tabled at several campuses to share information about their programming and resources.

PROGRAM ASSESSMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION REVIEW

This section covers key aspects of the California Students Vote Project (SVP) such as staffing, dynamic civic engagement initiatives and strategic collaborations. It also introduces a focused review of the Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (SCVEA) implementation, emphasizing the roles of Civic and Voter Empowerment Coordinators (CVECs) and overarching recommendations. California Students Vote Project Assessment

In 2023, the SVP showed progress through their effective staffing and impactful programming. The following is a detailed overview of what the SVP added into their program this year.

Staffing

In 2023, the SVP was staffed by two full-time coordinators who focused on creating and updating new and existing resources, programming, and strategic partnerships. Having two dedicated staff members allowed the capacity to develop intentional programming and resource creation.

Programming

The SVP demonstrated an impactful civic engagement strategy throughout 2023. By creating comprehensive resources, hosting regular events, and engaging directly with colleges and organizations, the SVP focused on promoting civic participation. The development of user-friendly resources, such as the **Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Implementation Guide** and the **Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan Guidelines**, reflected a commitment to accessibility. The strategic partnerships that were strengthened with higher education systems, student organizations and individual campuses emphasized the SVP's dedication to

collaboration. Overall, the SVP's programming in 2023 demonstrated an inclusive approach by promoting civic awareness and involvement across diverse higher education systems and communities.

Office Hours

The introduction of Office Hours by the SVP in 2023 exemplifies a two-way approach to supporting colleges, universities, and organizations. By designating a specific time each week for direct engagement, the SVP demonstrated a commitment to providing tailored support, guidance, and resources. This initiative not only showcases the SVP's responsiveness to the needs of its constituents but also reinforces a culture of ongoing collaboration and assistance. The availability of Office Hours serves as a practical and effective mechanism for encouraging meaningful connections and addressing the unique challenges faced by higher education systems in navigating civic engagement projects.

Quarterly Meetings

The quarterly meetings organized by the SVP in 2023 served as important platforms for disseminating information, encouraging collaboration, and addressing key civic engagement topics. By incorporating diverse topics such as outreach training, action plan workshops and spotlight speakers, the meetings demonstrated versatility. Overall, the quarterly meetings played a pivotal role in sustaining engagement and facilitating meaningful discussions among stakeholders.

Strategic Higher Education Partnerships

The SVP collaborated with 15 campuses and higher education institutions, gathering insights into their civic engagement efforts. Discussions centered on the implementation of the SCVEA. Important findings revealed discrepancies in voter registration data. In response, the SVP created a button to track college student voter registrations and address inaccuracies. The lessons learned from the meeting help shape the SVP's commitment to enhancing civic involvement, influencing programming even in non-election years. SCVEA Implementation Review

The following section focuses on the comprehensive review of the implementation of SCVEA, exploring key components such as the role of CVECs and Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plans (CVEAPs).

Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (SCVEA)

To enhance the accessibility and understanding of what is required from campuses, the SVP created the **Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act Implementation <u>Guide</u>**. The goal of this resource is to reach a broader audience, promote clarity of the requirements, and empower colleges/universities to meet their legal obligations. Secondly, this user-friendly guide serves as an educational tool, enabling informed decision-making from campuses.

Civic and Voter Empowerment Coordinators (CVECs)

The SCVEA states that all California State Universities and California Community Colleges must identify an individual on campus to be a CVEC. The CVEC is responsible for ensuring the duties outlined in the SCVEA are implemented on their campus.

CVECs include, but are not limited to:

- Government Relations Directors
- Student Life Directors
- Professors
- University/College staff that work closely with students

The SVP collects CVEC contact information to ensure that the program can effectively communicate with campuses, providing civic engagement information and resources.

Below is a table which shows the current number of CVECs collected per higher education system in 2023 compared to 2022.

As of December of 2023, the SVP **increased** the number of CVECs identified for the CCCs and **maintained** the number of contacts for the UC and CSU campuses. See

Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plans (CVEAPs)

To assist with the consistent collection of CVEAPs, the SVP created the **<u>Civic and</u>** <u>**Voter Empowerment Action Plan Guidelines**</u>. This guide establishes a more sustainable creation and collection of action plans.

Overall Recommendations

Clarity in Submission Schedule

Establish a uniform and clearly defined schedule for CVEAP submissions. Aligning with the current practice of midnight, October 1 of every even-numbered year helps to create a coherent understanding of requirements and deadlines, particularly benefiting campuses with limited resources.

Address High Turnover

Acknowledge the frequent turnover in CVEC positions. To mitigate this challenge, consider encouraging campuses to designate a position or office responsible for SCVEA implementation. This could alleviate consistent heavy workloads and foster continuity despite staff changes.

Enhance Enforcement Mechanisms

Explore avenues to strengthen the enforcement capacity within the framework of the SCVEA. While recognizing the law's current limitation on enforcing penalties, evaluating potential mechanisms for encouraging compliance without disproportionately impacting certain campuses is essential.

Allocate Funding Appropriately

Address the lack of appropriation for SCVEA implementation by exploring funding options to assist campuses in adhering to the law and hosting civic engagement activities. This is particularly crucial for campuses, especially California Community Colleges, expressing concerns about resource constraints.

PROGRAM GOALS

Reflecting on the 2023 achievements of the California Students Vote Project (SVP), all goals were accomplished. The SVP outlined 2024 program goals, highlighting a commitment to continuous progress and development. Below is a detailed overview of the SVP's goals for 2023 and 2024.

2023 Goal Performance and Reporting

This report highlights the successful achievement of all goals set for 2023, marking a significant milestone for the SVP. This accomplishment underscores the collective dedication and efforts by the SVP team. Below were the goals SVP set for 2023:

- 1. Improve awareness and understanding of the SVP and the SCVEA requirements.
- 2. Strategically increase college student voter education, outreach, and registration numbers.
- 3. Strengthen relationships with relevant groups to increase college student civic engagement efforts.
- How SVP achieved goal 1:
 - Created the <u>Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act</u> <u>Implementation Guide</u> to make the law's requirements more accessible and clearer. Additionally, the SVP team developed <u>Civic and</u> <u>Voter Empowerment Action Planning Guidelines</u> to assist campuses with action plan development.
- How SVP achieved goal 2:
 - o Identified each campus's CVEC to establish a central point of contact.
 - Increased campus engagement with their local election offices.
 - Created the <u>2023-2024 California Civic and Election Dates Calendar</u> and <u>Sample Email</u>
 - Hosted quarterly meetings to update our campus partners about our newly developed tools and resources. Additionally, we invite guest speakers from external organizations to share valuable tools and resources they provide.
 - Worked internally to make the Ballot Bowl process more streamline.

• Created a button to spread awareness of the college student voter registration link.

• How SVP achieved goal 3:

- Met with the higher education systems, student organizations, individual campuses, civic engagement organizations and community-based organizations to strengthen relationships with college campuses.
- Collaborated with the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge to simplify the action planning process.

2024 Program Goals

As this report acknowledges the SVP's accomplishments, the SVP team remains focused on sustaining momentum and establishing new goals to further advance the journey toward significant achievements related to college student civic engagement. In 2024, the SVP aims to:

1. Increase Awareness of Voter Registration Options

- Promote use of the unique voter registration link.
- Clarify the process for updating voter registration for college students away from home.
- Educate campuses on the process of requesting and using physical voter registration cards from the California Secretary of State.

2. Develop Educational Resources

• Create an updated version of the SVP Student Voter Resource Guide and California University and College Ballot Bowl Outreach Toolkit.

3. Promote Research and Awareness

 Promote awareness of the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement.

4. Strengthen Collaboration Between SVP, Campuses, and Stakeholders

- Strengthen partnerships with higher education systems and student organizations.
- Encourage more campuses to form a campus-wide civic engagement coalition.
- Increase campus participation in the California University and College Ballot Bowl.
- o Update the California University and College Ballot Bowl data website.

REFLECTION

This year, the California Students Vote Project (SVP) developed a more robust program to ensure its sustainability and efficiency. For example, the SVP focused on building relationships through weekly office hours, quarterly meetings, creating strategic resources, and working with individual campuses to identify potential civic engagement barriers. With the creation of the Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act Implementation Guide and the Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan Guideline resources, the SVP provided Civic and Voter Empowerment Coordinators (CVECs) and campuses with the support and guidance to understand the law and create strong action plans. Another significant achievement for the program was an increase in the number of CVECs obtained for California Community Colleges. As a result, the SVP had improved communication and reached more campuses to provide important updates. The SVP team also updated the website, creating a more user friendly, organized, and navigable platform.

The number of college students registered to vote reported to the California Secretary of State (SOS) was not an accurate representation of the voter registration efforts happening on colleges and universities. The SVP learned that thousands physical voter registration cards completed by college students were not reported to the California SOS. Once the SVP learned of this information, an effort to streamline the physical and online voter registration numbers was put into effect.

Throughout the year, the SVP continuously encouraged use of the unique voter registration link <u>https://registertovote.ca.gov/?t=s</u> during events, meetings, and publications.

Overall, the SVP program was successful heading into the 2024 election cycle where the team will be able use their newly obtained knowledge to continue register college students, and more importantly, encourage voter registration and participation.
