INTRODUCTION

California Secretary of State Students Vote Project Overview

Established in 2016, the California Secretary of State (SOS) Students Vote Project (SVP) is a statewide nonpartisan program that elevates college student voices and promotes civic engagement efforts to build a more inclusive democracy. Through the creation of the Students Vote Project, California was the first state in the nation to build partnerships across the state's major higher education systems to empower students to participate in the democratic process. Program objectives include increasing college student voter education, voter registration, and outreach. The SVP achieves these objectives by hosting civic engagement events, creating educational resources, and partnering with campuses and outreach organizations.

One civic engagement event that occurs during statewide election years is the **California University and College Ballot Bowl**. The Ballot Bowl is a friendly competition where higher education campuses compete to register the most students to vote and showcase civic engagement efforts. The SVP hosts the Ballot Bowl during an even numbered year ahead of the general election.

The Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (SCVEA)

In 2019, the Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (California Education Code §66850-66852; California Elections Code §2148.5) was enacted to give California colleges and universities the necessary tools to civic engagement and participation among young voters. In 2020, the California Secretary of State Students Vote Project was expanded to support and ensure implementation of the landmark law. The law requires the California SOS to work directly with the California Community Colleges (CCCs) and California State Universities (CSUs) to increase college student voter registration. Colleges and universities are encouraged to participate in SVP civic learning opportunities to receive and distribute voter education resources. While the University of California (UC) and the Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities (AICCU) campuses are not required to participate, they continue to be strong partners and supporters of student civic engagement.

The University of California National Center for Free Speech and Civic Engagement: The Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act Research Study

The California SOS SVP was contacted by Alex Kappus, Ph.D., a 2023-2024 Fellow from UC Center for Free Speech and Civic Engagement.

Dr. Kappus informed the California SOS SVP that he was conducting a research study on the Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (SCVEA). The SVP team met with Dr. Kappus regularly to answer questions about the SCVEA, connected him with California campuses, and suggested recommendations on how to move forward with his research.

Dr. Kappus's research focuses on institutional responses to the SCVEA. He interviewed Civic and Voter Empowerment Coordinators from the different higher education systems and documented their similar and unique experiences with implementing the requirements of the law.

COLLEGE STUDENT VOTER REGISTRATION

This section discusses methods utilized by the California Secretary of State (SOS) Students Vote Project (SVP) for tracking college student voter registration. This section also highlights the 2024 college student voter registration data collected by the California Secretary of State.

Voter Registration Tracking

A comprehensive approach is used to monitor and track college student voter registration in California using various methods. These methods include online registration using the college student voter registration link, paper voter registration cards, and the systematic updating of voter registration numbers by campuses throughout the year. Below is a detailed description of each tracking method used by the California SOS.

Online Voter Registration

College students' registration by campus is tracked through a [**college student voter registration link**](https://registertovote.ca.gov/?t=s) (<https://registertovote.ca.gov/?t=s>). This link allows the California

SOS to track college student voter registrations by college/university. The SVP partnered with [Rock the Vote](#) and the [Student Public Interest Research Groups](#) to capture additional college student voter registration numbers.

Paper Voter Registration

- Paper voter registration cards (VRCs) can be requested by campuses from the California Secretary of State's office. The campuses note on the [Voter Registration Card Statement of Distribution form](#) that they are requesting cards for college students and include the campus name.
- Email the completed Voter Registration Card Statement of Distribution Form(s) to vrc-vnc@sos.ca.gov and caststudentsvote@sos.ca.gov.
 - If the campus has any questions about requesting paper voter registration cards, it can contact vrc-vnc@sos.ca.gov and copy caststudentsvote@sos.ca.gov.

If a campus receives paper VRCs from their local County Elections Office or County Registrar of Voters, it can contact the respective county to request the affidavit number range. Once the affidavit number range is received from the county, it can email the number range to caststudentsvote@sos.ca.gov.

Track College Student Voter Registration Numbers by Campus

College student voter registration numbers are updated monthly throughout the year. Students can track campus voter registration numbers by visiting the [college student voter registration tracking website](#).

CALIFORNIA STUDENTS VOTE PROJECT PROGRAMMING

In 2024, the California Secretary of State Students Vote Project (SVP) focused on civic engagement through resource creation, quarterly meetings, the California College Civic and Voter Empowerment Summit, the California University and College Ballot Bowl, weekly Office Hours, and developing strategic partnerships with national civic engagement organizations. See below for additional details regarding the programming implemented this year.

Civic Engagement Resources

Civic and election resources were created to assist higher education campuses, faculty, and college students with the voting process for the 2024 election year.

- **2024 Presidential Primary Election Outreach Toolkit:** This toolkit provided sample social media graphics and email language for California Colleges and Universities for the March 5, 2024, Primary Election.
- **2024 California University and College Ballot Bowl Outreach Toolkit:** The Ballot Bowl Outreach Toolkit contained information about changes to the competition, a rubric, and included interactive outreach graphics.
- **2024 General Election College Student Voter Resource Guide:** This resource guide provided answers to common questions related to the General Election. This resource also included outreach graphics and sample email messages for college campuses.
- **Website Revamp:** The college student voter registration tracking website was redesigned to differentiate annual college student voter registration numbers from the Ballot Bowl competition. This update included adding more navigation tabs and created a separate table for the Ballot Bowl competition. An additional website update included creating the 2024 Ballot Bowl Countdown timer which counted down the days until the competition ended.

Action Planning Workshop Series with ALL IN-Campus Democracy Challenge

The [ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge](#) invited the SVP to be guest presenters for their action plan workshop that took place on September 2024. The SVP was provided a breakout room to present on the Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan Guidelines. Over 20 attendees joined the breakout room.

California University and College Ballot Bowl

The [California University and College Ballot Bowl](#) is a friendly competition where higher education campuses compete to register the most students to vote and showcase civic engagement efforts. The California Secretary of State Students Vote Project hosts the Ballot Bowl only during an even numbered year ahead of the general election.

Eligible campuses include:

- 23 California State Universities (CSU)
- 10 University of California Campuses (UC)
- 80+ Independent California Colleges and Universities (AICCU)

The purpose of the California University and College Ballot Bowl is to:

- Inspire college students to become active participants in our democracy.
- Motivate college campuses to adopt and implement policies that boost civic engagement and participation.
- Showcase best practices from the most civically engaged California colleges and Universities.

California College Civic and Voter Empowerment Summit

The SVP hosted the [California College Civic and Voter Empowerment Summit](#) which included guest speakers and Civic Engagement Coordinators from the different higher education systems. The SVP also hosted a virtual internship fair

highlighting state internships and fellowships for college students or recent graduates.

Enhancing Civic Engagement on College Campuses Ahead of the 2024 Presidential General Election

The [Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities](#) invited the California SOS SVP to a virtual event to discuss best practices and creative approaches to civic engagement opportunities.

Office Hours

The SVP had a total of 26 Office Hour appointments this year. Office Hours is a designated time when the SVP team is available to provide support, guidance, and resources. Office Hours demonstrates commitment from the California SOS by engaging with colleges, universities, college students and organizations by dedicating a time each week to guarantee availability. Quarterly Meetings

The SVP hosted two quarterly meetings this year, reaching a combined total of 281 registrants and virtual attendees. These meetings consisted of SVP program updates, election information, and the changes made to the 2024 California University and College Ballot Bowl competition.

- **February:** The SVP shared 2023 program highlights and resources related to the 2024 Presidential Primary Election for college students, including an interactive toolkit.
- **July:** Provided updates for the 2024 General Election and introduced the new changes and resources for the Ballot Bowl competition. The SVP was joined by campus partners who shared best practices to prepare college students for the 2024 Ballot Bowl competition and general election.

Why Vote? Campus Role in Voter Education and Registration

The [Student Senate for California Community Colleges](#) invited the SVP to a virtual event to provide information about the importance of voting and campus requirements for in-person and virtual events.

Strategic Higher Education Partnerships

To continue the goal of engaging with California colleges and universities, the SVP met with higher education systems, student organizations and campuses to discuss strategies to enhance civic engagement and prepare students for the 2024 Primary and General Elections.

CALIFORNIA STUDENTS VOTE PROJECT ASSESSMENT

This section analyzes key programs and projects of the California Secretary of State Students Vote Project (SVP) such as the California University and College Ballot Bowl, civic engagement initiatives and Office Hours. It also draws an analysis of the Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (SCVEA) implementation, emphasizing the roles of the Civic and Voter Empowerment Coordinators (CVECs) and campus recommendations for implementing the law. The following is a detailed overview of each key program and project.

2024 California University and College Ballot Bowl

During this year's competition, Monday, August 12, 2024 – Tuesday, November 5, 2024, over 65,000 college students registered to vote or updated their registration. In comparison, the 2022 Ballot Bowl competition resulted in 18,335 college students registered to vote.

College students participated from all CCC, CSU, and UC campuses and 82 out of the 86 AICCU campuses. The 2024 Ballot Bowl tracked registrations using [the college student voter registration link](https://registertovote.ca.gov/?t=s) (<https://registertovote.ca.gov/?t=s>), TurboVote, the Rock the Vote link (<https://CAStudentVote.org>), paper voter registration cards, and registrations at on-campus disability resource centers established through the [**National Voter Registration Act**](#).

The SVP made changes for the 2024 Ballot Bowl to ensure a more fair and equitable competition. Those changes include:

- Having the Overall Champion be the campus that performs well across all three categories.
- Introducing a point system.

- Scoring Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plans.

During the competition, the SVP created and distributed resources and materials to partners to encourage participation in the competition and to help students understand the registration and voting process and options to cast a ballot for the 2024 General Election.

Campuses and partners received regular updates via email, including a Ballot Bowl Outreach Toolkit for campuses to easily engage students. These toolkits were used by various campuses as tracked by the #2024BallotBowl hashtag on social media. The SVP also created weekly social media posts with the most recent Ballot Bowl standings on the California SOS' platforms, sent email updates to share new resources and information, and hosted and participated in several events to promote the competition.

2024 Ballot Bowl Competition Results

The Overall Champion for this year's competition is the University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB). UCSB performed well across all three categories in comparison to any other California campus that participated this year.

Category awards were also given to campuses in each higher education system and are listed below:

*In the spirit of camaraderie, each campus could only win one prize. The campuses with the asterisk did not immediately receive first place in the category.

Office Hours

In 2024, the SVP continued hosting Office Hours. Introduced in early 2023, Office Hours are dedicated weekly times to provide support, guidance, and resources. This year, the SVP held 26 Office Hour appointments with a range of colleges, universities, and civic engagement organizations.

Compared to 2023, when Office Hours were established to foster collaboration and accessibility, 2024 demonstrated the program's growth and commitment to addressing the unique needs of higher education institutions and civic organizations. This direct engagement approach remains a vital tool for building connections, sharing resources, and supporting civic engagement projects across diverse communities.

Quarterly Meetings

In 2024, the SVP hosted two quarterly meetings, drawing a total of 281 registrants. These meetings were more election-focused than in 2023, providing key updates on the Primary and General elections along with the changes to the California University and College Ballot Bowl competition.

While the 2023 meetings covered a broader range of topics such as outreach training and workshops, the 2024 meetings prioritized equipping stakeholders with the tools

and information needed to support voter engagement efforts in preparation for the 2024 election cycle.

The Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (SCVEA) Implementation Review

The following section focuses on the comprehensive review of the implementation of the SCVEA, exploring key components such as the role of Civic and Voter Empowerment Coordinators (CVECs) and Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plans (CVEAPs).

The SCVEA Implementation Guide

To enhance the accessibility and understanding of what is required from campuses, in 2023 the SVP created the [Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act Implementation Guide](#). The goal of this resource is to reach a broader audience, promote clarity of the statute requirements, and assist colleges/universities to meet their legal obligations.

Civic and Voter Empowerment Coordinators (CVECs)

The SCVEA states that all California State Universities and California Community Colleges must identify an individual on campus to be a CVEC. The CVEC is responsible for ensuring the duties outlined in the SCVEA are implemented on their campus.

CVECs include, but are not limited to:

- Government Relations Directors
- Student Life Directors
- Professors
- University/College staff that work closely with students

The SVP collects CVEC contact information to ensure that the program can effectively communicate with campuses, providing civic engagement information and resources.

Below is a table which shows the current number of CVECs collected per higher education system in 2024 compared to 2023 and 2022.

As of December 2024, the SVP made significant progress in identifying CVECs across various higher education systems in California. For California Community Colleges (CCC), the SVP increased engagement from 88% in 2023 to a full 100% in 2024, covering all 117 campuses.

The California State University (CSU) system and the University of California (UC) system both maintained consistent engagement at 100%, which covers all 23 CSU campuses and all 10 UC campuses. Additionally, the Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities (AICCU) saw a modest increase, rising from 20% in 2023 to 25% in 2024, with 22 out of 86 campuses identified.

These efforts demonstrate the California Secretary of State Students Vote Project's continued commitment to expanding and maintaining robust civic engagement support across California's diverse higher education systems. See Appendix A for a detailed breakdown of campuses with confirmed CVECs.

Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plans (CVEAPs)

The SVP currently collects CVEAPs every even-numbered year to stay in compliance with the SCVEA.

Below is a table which shows the current number of CVEAPs collected per higher education system in 2024 compared to 2022.

As of December of 2024, the SVP **increased** the number of CVEAPs collected across all systems, with significant improvements in the CCCs (from 28% to 55%), CSUs (from 56% to 91%), and UCs maintaining 100% participation. To assist with the consistent collection of CVEAPs, the SVP created the [Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan Guidelines](#) in 2023 and continued to share the guide in 2024. This guide establishes a more sustainable creation, understanding, and collection of action plans.

PROGRAM GOALS

Reflecting on the 2024 achievements of the California Secretary of State Students Vote Project (SVP), all goals were accomplished. The SVP outlined specific 2024 program goals, which highlight a commitment to continuous progress and development.

Below is a detailed overview of the SVP's goals for 2024 and 2025.

2024 Goal Performance and Reporting

This report highlights the successful achievement of all goals set for 2024, marking a significant milestone for the SVP. This accomplishment underscores the collective dedication and efforts by the SVP team. Below were the goals SVP set for 2024:

1. Increase Awareness of Voter Registration Options

- a. Promote use of the college student voter registration link.
- b. Clarify the process for updating voter registration for college students away from home.
- c. Educate campuses on the process of requesting and using paper voter registration cards from the California Secretary of State.

2. Develop Educational Resources

- a. Create a Presidential Primary Outreach Toolkit.
- b. Update the California University and College Ballot Bowl Outreach Toolkit.
- c. Update the College Student Voter Resource guide for the 2024 General Election.

3. Promote Research and Awareness

- a. Promote awareness of the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE).

- b. Promote awareness of a 2023-2024 Fellow from the University of California National Center for Free Speech and Civic Engagement, Alex Kappus, Ph.D., [research study](#).

4. Increase Collaboration Between SVP, College and University Campuses, and Stakeholders

- a. Assist campuses in forming campus-wide civic engagement coalitions.
- b. Create resources to encourage campus participation for the California University and College Ballot Bowl competition.
- c. Update the college student voter registration tracking website.
- d. Create engaging social media for California colleges and universities.

2025 Program Goals

The SVP team remains focused on building and expanding on the goals from 2024. In 2025, the SVP aims to:

1. Increase Civic Engagement in College Campuses
2. Develop Educational Resources
3. Continue to increase Collaboration Between SVP, Campuses, and Stakeholders, and Other Partners
4. Improve the California University and College Ballot Bowl Competition

CONCLUSION

The California Secretary of State Students Vote Project (SVP) made major strides in 2024. One of the biggest successes stemmed from the outcome of the California University and College Ballot Bowl. The competition registered over 65,000 college students to vote - more than three times the number of registrations in 2022.

The SVP grew stronger in 2024 through several key program improvements. The continuation of weekly office hours provided direct support to 26 different schools and organizations. The quarterly meetings attracted 281 participants and provided important updates about elections and program changes. Additionally, the SVP developed valuable new resources, including the 2024 Presidential Primary Election Outreach Toolkit and the 2024 General Election College Student Voter Resource Guide, aimed at making it easier for college students to access and understand crucial election information.

Another large accomplishment in 2024 was the increase in Civic and Voter Empowerment Coordinators (CVECs) contacts. The SVP now has CVEC contact information at all California Community Colleges (CCCs) and kept full participation from all California State University (CSU) and University of California (UC) campuses.

Continuing the goals set for 2024, the California Secretary of State SVP gained national recognition through a research study by Dr. Alex Kappus from the University of California National Center for Free Speech and Civic Engagement. Dr. Kappus's study focused on how colleges are implementing the Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act, providing valuable insights into the program's impact across the nation.

For 2025, the SVP has clear goals to increase students involved in civic engagement, create more educational materials, build stronger partnerships, and enhance the Ballot Bowl competition.

The success of 2024 has provided the SVP with a strong foundation for future elections. We hope the program can expand with additional resources to allow for more staff and equipment to better serve California colleges statewide. With improved tools and enhanced campus connections, the program can continue to assist college students in registering to vote and engaging in civic life. The California Secretary of State Students Vote Project will continue to increase civic engagement in each higher education system in California. We hope our work will inspire other states to also support college student civic engagement in higher education.
