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Introduction

California Secretary of State Students Vote Project

The [California Secretary of State Students Vote Project \(SVP\)](#) is a statewide nonpartisan program that amplifies college student voices and promotes civic engagement efforts to build a more inclusive democracy. Through the creation of the Students Vote Project, California was the first state in the nation to form partnerships across the state's major higher education systems to empower students to participate in the democratic process. The program objectives aim to improve college student voter education, increase college student voter registration, and provide civic and voter outreach opportunities. The SVP achieves these objectives by hosting civic engagement events, creating educational resources, and partnering with campuses and outreach organizations.

The Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act

In 2019, the Student Civic and Voter Empowerment Act (SCVEA) ([California Education Code §66850-66852; California Elections Code §2148.5](#)) was enacted to provide California colleges and universities with the necessary tools to enhance civic engagement and participation among young voters. In 2020, the California Secretary of State Students Vote Project was expanded to support implementation of the landmark law. The law requires the California SOS to collaborate with the California Community Colleges and California State Universities to increase college student registration. Colleges and universities are encouraged to participate in SVP civic learning opportunities to receive and distribute voter education resources. While the University of California and the Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities campuses are not required to participate, they continue to be strong partners and supporters of student civic engagement.

Preparing to Vote in Three Steps

1.

Register to vote or update

Vote in person at a county vote center or polling location.

- **In Person**
 - In-person voting locations offer important resources such as Same Day Voter Registration, ADA accommodations, replacement ballots, and other support in various languages.

Vote by dropping off your ballot.

- **Secured California County Drop-Off Locations**
 - Vote Center or Polling Location
 - County Drop Box
 - County Elections Office
- **United States Postal Service Mail**
 - Drop off your ballot at least 5 days before Election Day.
 - If voting on Election Day, request a manual postmark from a Postal Service employee.

Step #1: Register to Vote or Update Your Voter Registration

The first step in preparing to vote is to register or update your voter registration. Review the information below to learn more about the voter registration process and options.

Voting Eligibility and Identification Rules

The last day to register online to vote for the June 2, 2026, Primary Election is **Monday, May 18, 2026**. If you are unsure whether you are registered to vote, or if your voter registration information is up to date, visit voterstatus.sos.ca.gov.

To register to vote in California, you must be:

- A United States citizen and a resident of California
- 18 years old or older on Election Day
- Not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony
- Not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court

To complete the voter registration process, you will need either:

- a California Driver's License number, or
- a California ID number, or
- the last four digits of your Social Security Number (if you do not have a CA License or ID).

If you do not have a California driver's license, California identification card, or the last four digits of your social security number readily available, you can still register to vote. However, you will need to take additional steps to complete your voter registration. You will also need to verify your identity when voting for the first time. Register to Vote

You can register to vote or update your voter registration online or by paper.

- **Online Voter Registration**
 - You can register to vote or update your registration online at registertovote.ca.gov/collegestudents.
- **Paper Voter Registration**
 - Your county elections office can mail a paper voter registration application to you, or you can register in person at your county elections office.

Registering to Vote While Living Away from Home

If you are attending college in California and away from home, you may register to vote using either:

- the California address where you live when going to school (college address), or
- the California home address where you live when you are not going to school (traditional home address).

Registering to Vote Using Your California College Address

If you are a student living away from home while attending a college, trade school, or technical school, you can choose to register to vote by using your college address where your school is located. Students living in dorms should use their residence hall address if they wish to vote while living on campus.

If you use your college address to register to vote, your ballot will reflect the local contests in the county your school is located in. Your voting locations will also be in the county your school is located in.

Registering to Vote Using Your California Traditional Home Address

If you are a student living away from home while attending a college, trade school, or technical school, you can choose to register to vote by using your traditional home address where your traditional home is located.

If you use your traditional home address to register to vote, your ballot will reflect the local contests in the county your traditional home address is located in. Your voting locations will also be in the county your traditional home address is located in.

A student does not need to establish residency or domicile for any amount of time before they register to vote.

Choosing which address to use when you register to vote is a personal decision. Whatever you decide, you may not register to vote or vote in two places during the same election cycle.

Receiving Your Ballot

All California active registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot and can choose to receive a mailed copy of the State Voter Information Guide for the June 2, 2026, Primary Election.

- If you want to receive your vote-by-mail ballot at a different address other than where you are registered to vote, you can update your voter registration to a different mailing address. This mailing address can include your college address, traditional home address, or a P.O. Box.
 - You should update your registration as needed by the online voter registration deadline, Monday, May 18, 2026, to ensure you receive your vote-by-mail ballot on time for the upcoming primary election.

Same Day Voter Registration (Conditional Voter Registration)

If you missed the online voter registration deadline, you may still register to vote and cast a ballot on or before Election Day. Learn more about the [Same Day Voter Registration](#) process and eligibility.

Step #2: Choose to Vote in Person or Drop Off Your Ballot

The second step in preparing to vote is choosing whether to vote in person or drop off your vote-by-mail ballot. See the options below to help you decide what works best for you.

In Person

- Voter's Choice Act counties begin to offer early in-person voting on Saturday, May 23, 2026.
- In-person early voting locations throughout California will be open on Saturday, May 30, 2026.
- In-person voting locations offer important resources, such as:
 - Same Day Voter Registration
 - ADA accommodations
 - Replacement ballots
 - Support in various languages

Drop Off Your Ballot

- Every active registered voter will receive a ballot in the mail for each statewide election. County election officials will begin mailing ballots no later than Monday, May 4, 2026.

Step #3: Vote in the June 2, 2026, Primary Election

Now that you have registered to vote and decided how you want to vote, the last step is to vote. View your preferred option below for more information. The last day to vote is Tuesday, June 2, 2026, at 8:00 pm.

Vote in Person

If you would like to vote in person, visit caearlyvoting.sos.ca.gov to find your nearest vote center or polling location. Tuesday, June 2 is the last day to vote in person. Polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Vote by Dropping Off Your Ballot

If you choose to vote using your vote-by-mail ballot, mark your ballot and insert it in the return envelope provided and sign it. Make sure you complete all required information on the ballot return envelope, including your signature. Below are a few options to vote using your vote-by-mail ballot.

- **Secured California County Drop-Off Locations:**

- **Vote Center or Polling Location**

- Drop off your ballot at a vote center or polling location as early as possible. Visit caearlyvoting.sos.ca.gov to find your nearest vote center or polling location. The location must list “Drop-off Location” as a service.

- **Secure County Drop Box**

- Drop off your ballot at a secure drop box as early as possible. The secure drop boxes are clearly and visibly marked as an “Official Ballot Drop Box” that shows language stating that tampering with the drop box is a felony. Visit caearlyvoting.sos.ca.gov to find your nearest drop box.

- **County Elections Office**

- Drop off your ballot at your county elections office as early as possible. Find your county elections office.

- **United States Postal Service Mail:**

- Return your ballot by mail as soon as you receive it. Mailed ballots must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by your county elections office no later than 7 days after Election Day.

- o To ensure your ballot is postmarked by Election Day, make sure to mail it at least 5 days before Election Day. If mailing on Election Day, get a hand-stamped postmark from a postal employee inside a United States Post Office.

If you are in line to cast your ballot or drop off your vote-by-mail ballot before 8:00 pm on Election Day, then you have the right to vote. View the [Voter Right Bill of Rights](#) for more information on your voting rights.

Civic and Election Dates

Primary Election Dates and Deadlines

- **Monday, May 4:** County elections officials will begin mailing ballots by this date.
 - Counties offer early voting sites – to find a location and available times, please visit caearlyvoting.sos.ca.gov.
- **Tuesday, May 5:** Secure ballot drop-off locations open.
 - Ballots can be dropped off at a drop-off location, county elections office, or returned by mail.
- **Monday, May 18:** The last day to [register online to vote](#) for the June 2, 2026, Primary Election.
- **Saturday, May 23:** The first vote centers open for early in-person voting in all [Voter's Choice Act counties](#).
- **Tuesday, May 19 - Tuesday, June 2:** Same Day Voter Registration (Conditional Voter Registration) is available. Voters can use the [Same Day Voter Registration](#) process during this time.
- **Tuesday, June 2:** Election Day – Last day to vote in-person or return a ballot by 8:00 p.m. Polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
 - Vote-by-mail ballots must be postmarked no later than June 2. If mailing on Elections Day, get a hand-stamped postmark from a postal employee inside a United States Post Office.

What's on My Ballot?

The June 2, 2026, Primary Election Ballot will have the following state contests:

- **Governor**
 - As the state's chief executive officer, oversees most state departments and agencies, and appoints judges.
 - Proposes new laws, approves or vetoes legislation, and submits the annual state budget to the Legislature.
 - Mobilizes and directs state resources during emergencies.
- **Lieutenant Governor**
 - Assumes the office and duties of Governor in the case of impeachment, death, resignation, removal from office, or absence from the state.
 - Serves as president of the State Senate and has a tie-breaking vote.
 - Chairs the Commission for Economic Development; is a member of the State Lands Commission, and the Ocean Protection Council; and sits on the boards of the California university systems.
- **Secretary of State**
 - As the state's chief elections officer, oversees statewide elections and provides public access to campaign and lobbying financial information.

- Maintains certain business filings, authenticates trademarks, regulates notaries public, and enables secured creditors to protect their financial interests.
- Preserves California’s history by acquiring, safeguarding, and sharing the state’s historical treasures.
- **Controller**
 - As the state’s chief fiscal officer, serves as the state’s accountant and bookkeeper of all public funds.
 - Administers the state payroll system and unclaimed property laws and conducts audits and reviews of state operations.
 - Serves on the Board of Equalization, the Board of Control, and other boards and commissions.
- **Treasurer**
 - As the state’s banker, manages the state’s investments, and administers the sale of state bonds and notes.
 - Serves on several commissions, most of which are related to the marketing of bonds.
 - Pays out state funds when spent by the Controller and other state agencies.
- **Attorney General**
 - As the state’s chief law officer, ensures that state laws are enforced and investigates fraudulent or illegal activities.
 - Heads the Department of Justice, which provides state government legal services and represents the state in civil and criminal court cases.
 - Oversees law enforcement agencies, including county district attorneys and sheriffs.
- **Insurance Commissioner**
 - Heads the Department of Insurance, which enforces California insurance laws and adopts regulations to implement the laws.
 - Licenses, regulates, and examines insurance companies.
 - Answers public questions and complaints about the insurance industry.

- **Board of Equalization - District 1, District 2, District 3, District 4**
 - o Serves on the Board of Equalization, the state’s elected tax commission, which:
 - Assesses the property of regulated railroads and specific public utilities, and assesses and collects the private railroad car tax.
 - Oversees the assessment practices of the state’s 58 county assessors.
 - Assesses and collects the alcoholic beverage tax, and jointly administers the tax on insurers.

- **Superintendent of Public Instruction**
 - o As the state’s chief of public schools, provides education policy direction to local school districts, and works with the education community to improve academic performance.

 - o Heads the Department of Education and carries out policies set by the State Board of Education.

 - o Serves as an ex-officio member of governing boards of the state’s higher education system.

Create Your Voting Plan

Not knowing **how, when, or where** you will vote may lead to missed deadlines and being unprepared to cast your ballot. Create a plan to vote using the [College Student Voting Plan](#) tool to help you be a prepared voter.

- If you plan to vote in the June 2, Primary Election, be sure to register to vote or update your voter registration online at registertovote.ca.gov/collegestudents by **Monday, May 18, 2026**.
- If you missed the online voter registration deadline, **Same Day Voter Registration** is available in California up to and including Election Day.
- Ensure your mailing address is current to receive your vote-by-mail ballot and other important election materials for the June 2, Primary Election.
